WHAT WE DO

CESBA (The Ontario Association of Adult and Continuing Education School Board Administrators) is a provincial, non-profit professional association that represents, advocates for and supports adult and continuing education (A&CE) program staff working in nearly 60 school boards across Ontario. Incorporated in 1999 and provincially funded, CESBA works to ensure that adult and continuing education programs offered by school boards are accessible, affordable, and successful in helping learners achieve their education, training and employment goals.

We work collaboratively and engage with our school board members, community partners and funders to advance adult and continuing education in Ontario, and to prepare adults to enter or re-enter the workforce.

Our Mission

To provide adult, alternative and continuing education program staff working in Ontario's school boards with the knowledge, skills and abilities to assist learners in achieving their education and employment goals.

Our Objectives

- To provide A&CE professionals with the skills and knowledge necessary for effective leadership, supervision and advocacy of A&CE programs in a school board environment.
- To provide a forum for networking, collaboration and exchange of information, knowledge and exemplary practices related to A&CE for all CESBA members.
- To spread awareness and provide evidence to school board senior administration, relevant provincial and federal Ministries and departments, and regulatory and funding organizations about the positive impact of adult and continuing education delivered by Ontario school boards.
- To promote and recognize the core competencies unique to the administration of adult, alternative and continuing education in school boards across Ontario.

GOVERNMENT RELATIONS

CESBA works closely with our government partners to effectively represent adult and continuing education at the highest levels. CESBA's unique position allows us to participate in government-lead committees and provide input into policy developments, making sure that the collective voice of our members is heard.

Adult Credit Education Strategy (ACES) Days

As part of the Ministry of Education's Adult Credit Education Strategy, CESBA hosted province-wide Adult Credit Education Strategy days with representatives from each regional partnership table and from the Ministry of Education and the Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities. These meetings allowed the partnership tables to share their work in regionally-coordinated access to programs, and to exchange knowledge in their strategies and methodologies.

Lifelong Learning Advisory Committee (LLAC)

CESBA was pleased to participate in the first Lifelong Learning Advisory Committee (LLAC) meeting this year, which was held to officially establish the LLAC and to identify members' expectations, as well as review and discuss feedback on the Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities' discussion paper Strengthening Ontario's Adult Education System (2017).

The LLAC was established by the Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities (MTCU), the Ministry of Education (EDU), and former Ministry Citizenship and Immigration (MCI), as well as the Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services (MCCSS) to work with stakeholders and adult learners to design and implement an improved adult education system in Ontario.

CESBA releases response paper to the Adult Education Consultation

In January, the Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities, former Ministry of Citizenship and Immigration and the Ministry of Education released the consultation paper *Strengthening Ontario's Adult Education System*. CESBA collected feedback from school board members and issued a formal response to the consultation and discussion paper. The response reflected our members expertise and rich insight into the adult education system in Ontario and provided important information and examples for improving it.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

There is increasing demand for professional development opportunities for adult and continuing education program staff so that school board professionals can expand their skills and knowledge. From workshops to webinars, CESBA strives to give members practical tools and skills that they can directly apply to their roles. They in turn prepare adults to enter or re-enter the labour force.

In-Service for New Administrators

This two-day professional learning opportunity is held annually for principals and vice-principals new to adult and continuing education, giving administrators valuable information for their roles. Key issues and topics pertinent to leading strong A&CE programs were presented, such as Prior Learning Assessment and Recognition (PLAR) for Mature Students, adult-centred program design, operations, funding and reporting, and planning considerations. This event brings together both new and seasoned administrators as part of the New Administrators Mentorship Program, where Principals and Vice Principals who are new to A&CE are matched with experienced administrators who can share their knowledge and expertise in a mentoring capacity. The evaluation survey indicated that over 90% of participants found the two-day In-Service significantly or extremely valuable.

Enrolment Reporting Initiative (ERI) Webinar

This webinar, facilitated by the CESBA ERI Committee, was held in January 2018 for lead school board personnel responsible for electronic reporting to OnSIS. With presentations from Ministry of Education staff as well as reporting platform vendors, this webinar offered information about collecting, analyzing and reporting data; implementing the necessary technology; and developing processes, tools and services for timely, accurate and complete registers.

PLAR for Mature Students Assessors Training

CESBA held a two-day workshop in February 2018 for new PLAR for Mature Students Assessors. New assessors were matched with mentors to assist in the learning process and had the opportunity to meet and network with other assessors. All participants came away with valuable resources and information. This workshop was part of the PLAR for Mature Students Mentor-Mentee Program, where new PLAR assessors are matched with an experienced assessor for the school year.

HANDS ON, SKILLS UP! Employment-Related Experiential Learning in Ontario's Literacy and Basic Skills (LBS) Organizations Webinar

This webinar was hosted in partnership with Community Literacy of Ontario and focused on employment-related experiential learning opportunities in LBS programs in Ontario. Participants learned about the benefits and challenges of employment-related experiential learning in LBS as well as support needs and research outcomes.

New Professional Development (PD) Day for Adult Education Credit Teachers

CESBA was pleased to host its first Professional Development Day for Adult Education Credit Teachers on April 10, 2018 in Toronto. Forty-seven attendees had the opportunity to network with colleagues and attend sessions presented by the Ministry of Education on Experiential Learning, Education and Career/Life Planning, Assessing Global Competencies, and Responding to Learners Needing Additional Support in Literacy. The PD day was very well received, with many of the participants identifying professional development as an ongoing need for those in adult education. Over 95% of participants agreed that providing regular professional development opportunities for continuing education teachers will improve the learning experience of adult students.

NETWORKING

Providing regular in-person networking opportunities for our members is an important part of CESBA's work, giving school board sector staff time to learn from each other, exchange ideas and discuss common issues and challenges in adult and continuing education. It also allows staff from across the province to come together and collaborate to improve programs and solve problems.

Regional Meetings

School board staff come together from across the province to participate in regional meetings. The four provincial regions – North, West, East and Central – hold meetings two to three times per year to connect with colleagues in other boards in their area to discuss region-specific issues in adult and continuing education, hear updates from CESBA and from government staff, and provide input and feedback into new and upcoming initiatives.

Personal Support Worker (PSW) Work Day

CESBA hosted a training day for program staff working in school board-run Personal Support Worker programs. This day allowed program leads to connect with each other in person to learn from one another and discuss shared issues. The day included a discussion of classroom best practices, an update on reaccreditation and Ministry of Health regulations, and a workshop on how to support students with anxiety. Participants strongly agreed that the training day had a positive impact on their current role and that the information and resources received were practical and useful. Participants also noted the need for more time allocated to professional development.

RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT & KNOWLEDGE SHARING

From online tools to promotional materials, CESBA helps fill the need for practical resources to build capacity within the adult and continuing education sector and facilitate knowledge exchange.

Action Research Projects

With the scope of helping school boards improve outcomes for adult learners in credit programs, CESBA funded 18 school board research projects in four key areas of A&CE: role of PLAR for Mature Students in credit accumulation; information, intake, assessment and referral; career counselling, guidance and pathway planning; and flexible delivery of programs and services.

80% of participants at the Action Research Day reported the event as being extremely valuable or very valuable.

Participating school boards attended an in-person work day in November 2017 to learn how to create a research plan with their

board teams. Staff were able to draft research questions and provide feedback to other boards, and teams had the opportunity to connect with other boards working on similar areas of focus. This research activity provided school boards with the opportunity to do in-depth analysis into various aspects of school improvement planning and was supported by access to external expertise in research methodology, data analysis and data presentation.

Poster summaries of the completed research projects were produced and shared with colleagues at the Action Research Symposium and posted to the CESBA website.






CESBA launches the new www.cesba.com!

Multilingual PLAR for Mature Students Promotional Videos for Newcomers

To help raise awareness of the Prior Learning Assessment & Recognition (PLAR) for Mature Students program offered by school boards, CESBA created a new promotional video geared towards newcomers to Ontario. The videos are available in English and French with multilingual subtitles in a further six languages: Spanish, Tagalog, Urdu, Simplified Chinese, Punjabi and Arabic. The videos highlight the benefits of PLAR and how eligible learners can obtain credits for their work and life experiences. School boards and partner agencies that work with newcomers can download the videos from CESBA's website to post to their own websites and social media accounts. The videos have had nearly 1,000 views on CESBA's YouTube channel alone!

Updated LBS Practitioner Training Website

In June 2017, CESBA launched the newly updated Literacy & Basic Skills (LBS) Practitioner Training website at lbs.cesba.com. The updated training modules, intended for new LBS practitioners and managers, are easy follow and understand. The fun and interactive modules are also aligned with the Ontario Adult Literacy Curriculum Framework (OALCF) milestones and culminating tasks. Users receive a certificate of completion at the end of the course modules.







Keeping professionals informed through CESBA Express Mail



Promoting the Ontario High School Diploma

In August 2017, after launching a Request for Proposals, CESBA's High School Diploma Promotion Campaign Committee hired strategic marketing agency Ramp Communications to take the lead on launching a brand-new awareness campaign to promote the Ontario Secondary School Diploma (OSSD), or Ontario high school diploma. Throughout the fiscal year, Ramp and CESBA staff gathered feedback from our members to help determine the direction and messaging of the campaign and to identify the necessary



elements to make it successful. Creative concepts were produced and feedback was gathered from current adult learners in focus groups in three regions, as well as through an online survey.

The goal of the campaign, which is scheduled to launch in Fall 2018, is designed to encourage working-age Ontarians who did not complete their secondary school education to get their high school diploma through their local school board. The campaign will include, among other elements, a microsite with key information, digital advertisements, and a campaign toolkit for boards to personalize for their regions and audiences.



2017 CONFERENCE

Paths to Success: Improving Learner Options & Pathways



CESBA hosted its annual Conference on November 30 and December 1, 2017 in Toronto. More than 300 professionals working in the adult and continuing education sector came together to share best practices and knowledge around A&CE in the province, including administrators, program coordinators/managers, guidance

counsellors and teachers. The Conference featured three learning streams: Strategic Planning and Program Development; Service Coordination/Pathway Planning; and New Technologies. Nearly thirty breakout sessions were facilitated, offering learning on topics such as Optimizing the Inter-Generational Relationship in Today's Workforce; Tracking Student Success; and Open Data in Education. Six Guided Network Committee Sessions allowed for further discussion and knowledge sharing in key areas of A&CE.

The keynote address by Keith Neuman (Executive Director, Environics Institute) on *Canadian Millennials: Social Values and Life Aspirations* was thought-provoking and very well received. Additionally, the agenda featured a Government Panel Policy Discussion led by Sunil Johal (Policy Director, Mowat Centre School of Public Policy and Governance, University of Toronto) as well as a speech by The Honourable Mitzie Hunter, former Minister of Education.

Participant evaluations showed that once again, the CESBA Conference was a resounding success: 84% of respondents indicated that the Conference offered a good variety of relevant workshops, and the same number thought the workshops were of high quality. Over 92% of respondents thought the variety of workshops was very good to excellent. In total, 92% of respondents felt that the overall Conference was a success.

OUR PEOPLE

THE CESBA BOARD OF DIRECTORS

CESBA is governed by a Board of Directors, made up of individuals who work in the A&CE sector. The Board uses a Policy Governance model, which ensures that the organization is inclusive, transparent and accountable to its members and its funders. 


